The weather was warm during the month of July and our campers spent many days enjoying the waterfront, swimming, playing on the aqua mat, kayaking, paddle boarding, canoeing, and sailing. With all of the sunshine, lake temperatures soared over 80 degrees. Hydration was the word of the summer and everyone carried their water bottles. August's damp weather forced our amazing program staff to work overtime coming up with fun and novel program days. The summer weather brought bountiful harvests in our gardens. We even found a few unexpected cantaloupe and watermelons growing in our camp composted soil.

The Huckster and Candlelight ceremonies magically ended each session with 185 campers becoming Hucksters and 14 of our staff earning their 10-year double Huckster awards. Lauren Kehoe, Annie Colbert, Ellie Jones, Peter King

all became triple Hucksters (15 years at Huckins) and Alisson Borowski Kolodner celebrated her 20th summer.

How quickly the summer was gone and we had to say our goodbyes. As campers and staff drove out the driveway our Tri-athletes and Family Campers roared in. Our groups and programs after camp have been amazing—over 300 students from our local schools attended teambuilding activities on the ropes course and our Mother/Daughter weekend continues to be our biggest event of the year with 293 campers.

As we pull the final boats out of the water, we are sad to have another season end. We must give special thanks to all of the many volunteers who help Huckins open, run pre and post camp programs and participate in summer programming. We extend a big Alamen to our three volunteers who spent over three months at Huckins. Hope Spruell spent her summer making a maintenance manual, and once again Peter and Jill King volunteered above and beyond—helping in the office, with the fishing, and doing all duties as assigned. The Huckins spirit is alive and well and can be felt the instant you walk through the white gates.

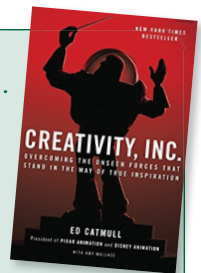

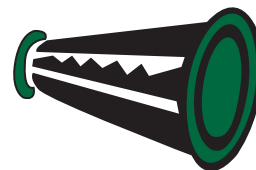

Huckins Love Story

Sylvia Thayer and Philip Zaeder

On a cool day in mid-April, Jody and I made our way to Center Ossipee and the Junction Restaurant to meet with Huckins Alumni Sylvia Thayer and Philip Zaeder. Married over 60 years, the Thayer/Zaeder romance began at Camp Huckins—a true Huckins Love Story. The two met when they were both on staff in the mid-fifties. Sylvia, a former camper and Wellesley student was working as a counselor in 1956. Philip started at Huckins in 1952 as a “kitchen boy” and moved up to the position of cook in 56. Philip, a Yale undergraduate, had a friend from school who told him he knew of a Wellesley girl who was a counselor at Camp Huckins. The two met in 1956 and became friends. That summer Philip started writing letters in French to another counselor at the camp. A bit jealous, Sylvia told him that he should stop writing the letters because the counselor did not speak French and she was having to translate. The two started dating and the rest is history. On June



14 1958, they were married and spent their last summer at camp. Sylvia was the Junior Division Leader and Philip served as the Mountain Trip Director.

Outside the kitchen Philip, a diver, remembers fondly participating in the famous Water Carnival and “Christmas in July” festivities. In those days the camp ate in the Lodge.

Sylvia studied astronomy at Wellesley and Philip studied theology at Yale. Philip went on to Theological School and working at Yale Divinity and

serving as a school chaplain and administrator at Phillips Academy in Andover, MA. Sylvia taught science in an all-girls junior/senior high school, then as the mother of three she worked in a variety of roles from a liturgical dancer to astronomy teacher to dean at Phillips Academy.

Today, Sylvia and Philip live in an old farm house in Milton, New Hampshire. They have three grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

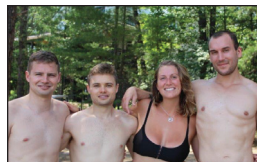
